There is a tribute to Miss Laird in this newsletter which honours her significant contribution to our kura. I would like to thank the many families and other schools in our region who have sent us their thoughts. Your compassion is very much appreciated.

Tribute to Miss Laird

This week we came together as a staff to mourn the loss of our friend and colleague, Nicky Laird. Nicky was a kind, caring, hardworking woman, part of the fabric of our kura. She will be missed enourmously. Her wit, banter, regular irreverence and direct manner of communication are the stuff of folklore in our staff room. "Nickyisms" will be used for years to come.

The following excerpts are from staff members and students as they shared their grief and memories in remembrance of Nicky.

"Nicky would spend hours preparing her lessons – her classes would be expected to work hard and do a lot of writing. Nicky was a scrupulous marker. We would have detailed discussions about student's work. Nicky wouldn't let get me away with anything but at least I knew I could send work away for moderation with absolute confidence that we had done the right thing."



"Nicky went away on a lot of field trips.
These were great times as she was a
passionate Geographer. The following
quote from Robert Louis Stevenson in
1905 " I am told there are people in the
world who do not care for Geography and
Maps – I find that hard to believe" is apt.

"Alongside her teaching, Nicky attended camps, helped students learn ballroom dancing in the lead up to the ball, and participated in House Events - including running the Cross Country each year clad in the bright yellow colours of her Hamilton House."

"She was very organised with her work. She always had everything laid out for our class. She had a quiz for us every week - she always knew all the answers and enjoyed sharing it with us. She liked to tell us funny stories about herself - about things like her university days. We all enjoyed getting to know her and we will miss our wonderful teacher." Year 13 Geography Student.

Her biggest responsibility outside the classroom was being the Teacher in Charge of Yr 9 & 10 Camps. Ten years of checking tents, ropes, counting tent pegs and chasing up teachers who had not returned them to the right place on time. She was always extremely appreciative of the help from her ODR committee and grateful for all staff who attended camps and helped make them the success they are to this day.

Two years ago, Nicky created an entirely new Outdoor Ed experience for our Year 10s - Activity Days. Here Nicky was able to motivate both Staff and Students to get outside their comfort zone and try something new.

Nicky; school and especially the Social Sciences Department won't be the same without you. The relationships you forged with the team in the F Block office won't be forgotten. The impact you made on an entire generation of students is your legacy to JHC. Nicky will be greatly missed by all her family, friends and colleagues - may she now forever rest in peace.

The James Hargest College staff wish to thank our community for their support during Term Two as we closed early on a Thursday to work on our Year 9 Curriculum proposals. This time was extremely valuable for Departments to work together consistently and work through a process of evaluation and reflection of what is currently offered for Year 9 students, and how we can shape what we do to ensure we are always striving to achieve our Mission Statement: to equip all our students to create the best possible future for themselves and their world.

Departments have thoroughly analysed community voice, student voice and staff voice to look at what works well in their Departments and what could be improved. This feedback was the basis for developing redesigned courses for Year 9 in 2026. At the end of the term, Departments submitted their proposals to our leadership team who worked through to look at curriculum coverage and the balance between student choice and non negotiables. There are a lot of exciting courses being proposed by teachers who are leaning in to their areas of passion and in areas students are engaged.

At the start of this term students in Years 7, 8 9 and 10 were presented with slides outlining the proposed new courses. Teachers helped them understand what these new courses will look like and how they will work together. This week students have been asked to rank the courses in order of their choices and our wonderful people who form team timetable are working with the numbers to consider how it can work together. If your child is in Years 7 - 10, we encourage you to talk with them about the courses they have seen and what they have selected as their top choices. This has been a significant process of evaluation and creation and we are excited by what the future holds for our curriculum at James Hargest College. We thank all of our staff for their mahi through this period. When we work through the next steps, we will be hosting a whānau information evening where you will be invited to come along and hear what we are planning as well as ask any pātai. 
ShowQuest

WHĀNAU KŌRERO

Trauma in children significantly disturbs their sense of safety and normalcy, leading to substantial emotional and behavioural changes. Such disturbances often result from exposure to traumatic events, which may be exacerbated by continuous media coverage. This exposure can trigger stress, anxiety, and trauma, with varying recovery timelines due to the unpredictable nature of trauma's impact. Observing young people grappling with these effects can be highly distressing for parents and caregivers.

It's important to establish a nurturing environment to help restore a child's sense of security to help promote resilience. Active involvement in their recovery is essential, as is recognising the unique, personalised needs of each child in responding to trauma. Depending on their age, children may present with different symptoms, such as regressive behaviours in younger ones or withdrawal and agitation in older children and teens.

TRAUMA Recovery

It is important to monitor and manage the type of information children may access to reduce their emotional distress.

The brain stores traumatic events as powerful emotional memories, influencing behaviour through mechanisms beyond a child's conscious awareness. By providing young people with support and equipping them with coping mechanisms to handle uncertainty, parents and carers can greatly enhance a child's capacity to recover and build long-term emotional resilience.

Tequin and his team had to work to maximise their points across the judging criteria, while receiving coaching and mentoring from 4C staff and industry experts.

Their end of the week pitch event provided an exciting opportunity for participants to showcase their skills to the fullest and impress our judges. The pitch also offers a great chance to connect with future employers present at this event!

During his stay, competitors had 24 hour access to the 4C makerspace – equipped with 3D printers, laser cutters, CNC machines, iPads with Procreate/animation software, robotic equipment and a range of other creative and digital makerspace tools.





How schools support ākonga Māori and Pacific students to attain University Entrance

Report from NZCER

Researchers came to Hēmi Hākena and spoke to staff and ākonga about what helps them succeed at our place. Six schools were asked to take part in the study. Each selected school had more than 100 Year 13 students, of whom around 20% or more were Māori and/or Pacific. At each school, UE attainment for these groups of students had been at least 10% higher than their Equity Index (EQI) band average for at least 3 of the past 4 years. These statistics are a credit to all of us and while we consistently seek to improve, creating opportunities for all ākonga is something of which we can all be very proud. Brigadier's Diploma


This Diploma provides the framework against which students are assessed in Year 11. It maintains and protects academic rigour, while incorporating wider holistic educational goals. Year 11 is an important year where students are gaining the skills and knowledge to achieve to the best of their ability in NCEA Level Two the following year.

Diploma Structure

Each Subject counts towards the total academic score. The total maximum score per course is 8. The six scores are added to create a score out of 48. The table converts the score to a Diploma Level. The Diploma may also be endorsed with important aspects such as Sports, Cultural or Āwhina contribution.

Assessment towards the **Diploma**

There are common assessment opportunities in each subject. They can consist of projects, presentations, tests, homework, examinations, checkpoints and planning materials. These will be dependent on the course. Assessments contribute to a total score for the course.

Celebrating Excellence

In the last week of last term we welcomed back our scholars from the class of 2003. This ceremony celebrated what they had achieved and showed our Year 12 and 13 students in the audience what can be achieved with a goal, determination and hard work. We are very proud of their academic successes as well as their wide ranging extra curricular success. Ben Elder and Meadow Bodkin-Allen both addressed the assembly and we have included excerpts from their wonderful speeches below. Both spoke very deliberately about the need to have balance and joy in your life. Something for us all to think about!

Excerpt from Ben Elder's speech:

Most people think that in order to achieve highly, you have to have some outstanding, genius plan and have 'no life' and commit all your hours to studying. In reality, all you need is just hard work. I didn't do significantly more study during exam time than others, but my difference was that throughout the year I made sure I was keeping up with the work. Rather than doing a massive amount of hours during exam time to understand stuff, I spread these hours out throughout the year. Small amounts throughout the week to revise areas that didn't make sense (or possibly relearn if I wasn't paying attention) goes a long way at the end of the year, which I found to be very effective. I always made sure I understood the basic and underlying concepts for a topic, and I learnt how to then apply this knowledge rather than rote-learning a bunch of model answers over and over. This made it far easier in exams when there was the typical NCEA horror questions, as I could apply this knowledge. In terms of how I studied, for me, I could never sit down to study unless I'd done some exercise. I found that getting some fresh air and blood pumping through the body gave me a clear mind, and I was able to properly sit down and get a solid chunk of work done.

However, one of the key things I believe really helped me was maintaining a great work-life balance, and is something I strongly encourage everyone to have, no matter what you are trying to pursue in life. I see it as something that you need in life, in order to prevent yourself from becoming burnt out or struggling with motivation. If you don't have a good balance, you'll end up pushing yourself way too far, and the resulting burn out that may occur will leave you being far too

harsh on yourself, or just not enjoying things the way you used to. I balanced a part time job, football and squash, and service commitments like Leo Club co-president and house captain, and I found this gave me a wide variety of things to do that kept me busy. In doing so, this helped prevent me from getting bored when I needed to study. Without a balance, you have nothing else in life to enjoy or take perspective from except the pursuit of excellence, regardless of what area that pursuit is. It wasn't all great though as the high amount of commitments I undertook came with one of the only struggles for me. I found it hard to find time to juggle everything, and this taught me that there is a fine line between balance and overcommitment.

A piece of advice I recently received upon starting uni in Canterbury was that my achievements do not define me. This was a wise piece of advice and really stuck with me, as I believe that it's important to know your own worth and who you really are rather than just basing your worth on your achievements. If you don't know who you are upon going out into the world, it is quite easy to feel lost and overwhelmed if all you base your worth on is your achievements. It's so important that you don't let this happen, because if you don't reach one of your goals or you feel overwhelmed upon reaching university, you'll be far too hard on yourself. While yes, it's great if you achieve your goals, whether it's academic, sporting, cultural or other, there's absolutely nothing wrong if you miss the mark. Don't let your achievements consume you as there is more to everybody than just what they've accomplished in life. Instead, find worth elsewhere; through your many relationships in life, your family, friends and more.

When I was in Parliament receiving my award in May, Chris Luxon gave some words that really resonated with me, and I'd like to leave them with you all. As generic and basic as it sounds, he said don't be afraid to make mistakes, and surround yourself with likeminded people, no matter where you are or what you're doing in life. But what really connected with me was this; don't just pursue academic excellence, pursue a life of meaning, filled with value and purpose. Because at the end of the day, what's most important is not succeeding, but succeeding with a purpose that makes it worthwhile.

Excerpt from Meadow's speech:

What a privilege it is to stand up here and speak to you all. It feels like yesterday I was sitting in the audience listening to Halle Faherty speak about her academic experiences. She inspired me and I hope I can do a wee bit of that for you today.

I'm not going to stand up here and say that my time through NCEA was easy and that I always prioritised my study because I didn't. My life became a balancing act when NCEA hit. I was working multiple jobs to hopefully support my further study, managing extra curricular activities that I valued, trying to be a part of my local theatre community, something that was extremely important to me and then on top of that keep up my school work. I know many of you will relate to that and maybe you don't but I am sure you can understand how things can take priority.

My passion did not lie in all my academic subjects. It did for some, like music and drama. Doing Scholarship music in year 12 pushed me far beyond what I thought I was capable of. I thought that once I got to year 13 I wouldn't care so much for my results but it was quite the opposite. After achieving my academic goals in year 11 & 12, I didn't want to just give up in year 13. I kept working and almost studied more that year than I ever have before. But this isn't to say that I didn't burn out, I did, many times. It was hard to



find where my energy should go and I was trying to let it go everywhere at once. My passion lies in the performing arts and it always has. I chose subjects that connected to that like music and drama but then also challenged myself with statistics and classics. I loved all my subjects which certainly helped ignite the desire to achieve at a high standard. However passion and certainty can take time. You need to feel ok with the fact that your plans may change. You may have no clue what you want to do with your life right now, and of course you don't!! None of us do.

What is important is doing something that you love, following what will make you happy, not what will make someone else happy. It's easy to get convinced in what society may tell you you have to do but you don't need to listen to that. Year 13 is about keeping your options open, figuring things out and trying to have a bit of fun before "adulting".



But I listened to my heart. I gave myself a break and a feeling of relief to have some time to decide what I really wanted to do.

But who knows if it will work out, I have to believe and hope it will. But I also need to be aware that my plan might change. That's how all of you need to feel getting ready to decide your next steps.

I hope you all have a feeling of believing in yourselves going into this academic year, you never know what might happen if you just put a wee bit more effort in. But also be prepared for change, it isn't a bad thing, just something to help you learn. I really hope each and every one of you one day find your

Students can achieve the requirements any time over their time at school, and can try to achieve the requirements many times throughout their NCEA journey. 
