Senior Leadership Team's Comment

Hoki mai anō - Welcome back!

Term Four has arrived and with it, finally some sunshine. We have been thrilled to welcome our students back this week. The behaviour and focus has been superb across our kura and we look forward to a busy term full of opportunities and celebrations.

September at the Junior Campus was packed with a myriad of sporting, cultural and academic learning opportunities. Our choir performed a slick, polished performance at this year's Singout at the Civic Theatre and they are looking forward to upcoming opportunities to give back to our community by singing at our local retirement villages. Black, Red and White Day provided the opportunity to dress up and raise funds for the Southland Charity Hospital and our school leaders visited the hospital to check out our previously donated bricks. This is such a fantastic asset for our community and we are proud to be part of something so special.

This year we raised our expectations for the use of Te Reo Māori during Te Wiki o te Reo Māori. Our students rose to the wero (challenge) and it was evident in the pātai (questions) they asked and rerenga kupu (phrases) they used, which earnt them tīkiti to spend at the toa (store). It was a fabulous week and we thank our kaiako (teachers) for their commitment to kōrero Māori.

Mathematics has been a strategic focus for Junior Campus teachers' professional learning this year and we have been fortunate to work with Rob Proffitt-White, who is an internationally recognised expert in effective mathematics pedagogy. He spent the 11th of September demonstrating lessons in some of our classrooms and working with our teachers to align our assessment practices to the new Refreshed Curriculum. The impact

of this professional learning was evident in how well our students performed at the SMAC Maths Competition on the 25th of September, taking out 1st, 2nd and 3rd places in both Year 7 and 8!

This term we look forward to many highlights including meeting our Year 7s for 2025 on New Entrant Day. On this same day the Year 8s spend the morning at the Senior Campus which is an exciting part of their transition to Year 9. Our kapa haka roopu are continuing their hard mahi by preparing to compete at Putangitangi and we have many teams preparing to compete in various sports competitions including over 100 students involved in the adventure race.

The House Haka competition in Week 10 was a highlight at the Senior Campus. The competition began with a staff haka, led powerfully by Matua Tane, and this was followed by four incredible house haka performances. Congratulations to Hamilton House who took out the win. The mana and kotahitanga shown was incredible and we were so proud of our rangatahi for leading this mahi alongside the Heads of House.

Two international trips took place during the holidays and our sincere thanks to Miss Jenkinson, Mrs Adams, Mr Byatt, Ms Turner and Ms Toms for providing such incredible opportunities for our ākonga. Students on the Classics trip were so lucky to visit sites of historical significance in Italy and Greece and our longstanding relationship with Kumagaya Nishi High School was affirmed on the Japan trip. These experiences are only possible with the support of our Board of Trustees and we are grateful for their enthusiasm and input into these trips.

NCEA exams run from 5th November through to 28th November. Students have been working hard all year to prepare for these assessments. Constructing and following a well planned revision programme will assist students to achieve the best possible grades. Teachers will be providing revision material and giving suggestions on aspects of the learning to focus on. There is also a schedule of available tutorials in this newsletter. Teachers want students to do their very best and will give valuable feedback and feedback on practice exams, essays and test papers.

Year 9 and Year 10 exams will occur in Week 4 and Week 5 of the term. These are assessments that cover the whole year's work and are an important part of learning how to prepare for NCEA exams when in the senior school. Students will be given a guide to exams booklet with all of the information they require. Look out for it at home. A schedule of the exams for Year 9 and 10 is included in this newsletter.

Next week we will celebrate Youthmark Awards, the week after is Senior Prize Giving and the following day our Year 13 students will be piped out of school, five years after they were first piped in the memorial gates as part of Ka Hikitia. Mā mua ka kite a muri, mā muri ka ora a mua - Those who lead give sight to those who follow, those who follow give life to those who lead. We are grateful for the fantastic example they have shown our younger students about what it means to belong to James Hargest.






Digital Technologies Programming

Flectronics in the Classroom

Electronics is the branch of engineering and programming that deals with the design, development, and application of electronic circuits and devices. It's a field that's constantly evolving, with new technologies emerging every day. From smartphones and computers to medical devices and space exploration, electronics plays a crucial role in almost every aspect of modern life. Our Year 11 Programming students have been exploring the exciting world of electronics using the versatile Arduino microprocessor. They've created some impressive projects, including a whack-a-mole-style game by Nathaniel Shefford, Saranya Sarisa, and Munokoa




Faletiute. Back in the '80s, when programming was becoming more common, people started doing all sorts of wild things. This included designing arcade games. In this game, the goal is to react as fast as possible to the LEDs that light up by pressing the corresponding button. But don't cheat or hit the wrong button, or the game's over. This game is based on the super-popular arcade game, 'Whack-A-Mole'. Amanda Henderson and Logan Jordan (Year 12 Programming Students) developed a pair of AR goggles using an Arduino microprocessor to help people be more aware of their surroundings. These goggles have a sensor on the front that can tell how far away things are up to 10 meters. When the user gets close to a wall, a red light will flash, and a speaker on the side will make a beeping sound. The volume and speed of the beep get louder and faster as the user gets closer to the wall. An LCD screen on the goggles shows how far away the user is from the wall and warns them if they're too close. Cameron Labes (Year 12 Programming Student) created a thrilling two-player game that combines visual and auditory elements. The objective is simple: press your button as many times as possible within 10 seconds. As the game begins, players frantically tap their buttons, and the game tallies their scores. Colourful LEDs provide visual feedback, counting down the initial seconds and indicating button presses and the current lead. To enhance the gaming experience, Cameron incorporated sound effects, adding an auditory dimension to the gameplay.

Biology Olympiad

Three Year 12 students; Megan Wheeler, Bea Christie and George Bramer recently participated in a 3 hour optional examination to gain entrance into the 2024/25 New Zealand International Biology Olympiad programme.

A massive whakamihi to Megan Wheeler and Bea Christie (pictured L-R), who are two of 290 students in New Zealand who gained a Bronze Certificate in the 2024/25 New Zealand International Biology Olympiad entrance examination.

Gaining the Bronze Certificate means Bea and Megan have moved through to the next stage of this competition, which is a tutorial programme that began in the Term 3 holidays and will run through our upcoming summer holidays.

The tutorial programme involves the completion of a series of Mastering Biology assignments, compulsory question sets and discussion in a closed group.

Megan, Bea and their peers are supported by NZIBO tutors and are encouraged to keep in touch and ask lots of questions of their tutors and peers. The aim is to establish an online community of learners. The work done in this tutorial programme is to support Megan and Bea to participate in another exam in early 2025 which selects up to 35 students to move to the next stage of this competition, a Hands on selection camp to select the final team of 4 students who will represent New Zealand at the International competition.

Bea and Megan's success in 2024 follows on from Year 13 students Declan Crombie and Jian Torrepalma who gained a Silver Certificate in the 2022/23 and 2023/24 competitions. Both attended the Selection Camps, but unfortunately did not make the final team. Declan did however go on to become a tutor in the group supporting Jian and his peers in the following years' competition.

Alexander Fleming delivered a standout performance as Juror Number 3, embodying the character's aggression and deep-seated frustrations with chilling authenticity. Felix Young took on the crucial role of Juror Number 8, the lone voice of reason who dares to question the guilt of the accused. Young's portrayal of calm resilience stood in stark contrast to Fleming's intensity, making for a gripping dynamic between the two.

Lilly Melligan's portrayal of Juror Number 10 offered a powerful commentary on how prejudice can cloud judgment. Melligan brought nuance to the role, highlighting





the internal conflict of a character forced to confront their own biases. Nicklaus Tutini, as Juror Number 9, delivered a heartfelt performance that urged the audience to consider the wisdom and experiences of the elderly.

Behind the scenes, Emerson Dalhdavis co-directed the production alongside Ms. Smith, and their collaboration paid off in spades. The staging was minimalist but effective, allowing the performances to shine and the moral dilemmas to take center stage.

The judges thoroughly enjoyed the participant pressure received from competitors to present from the impromptu reading choices before delivering their verdict. While they may have "felt in such a pickle" initially, in all reality, they relished the opportunity to "laugh oneself into stitches" and channel their inner thespian!
