Very exciting and a testament to the ongoing hard work of Al Pannett. We thank him for all his work with this project and can't wait to see it take shape over the next twelve months.

SIT- Professional Engineering Day Out

More than 70 of Southland's brightest young minds gathered at SIT for the Professional Engineering Day Out. We were thrilled to have some of the region's leading engineeringfocused employers on board to inspire and connect with future talent!

Feedback showed that the day was incredibly valuable for students, giving them insights and inspiration to explore engineering pathways.

After attending the event:

• 65% of students felt more confident about the pathways into engineering, with another 35% somewhat more confident.

• 32% of attendees could see barriers to pursuing a career in engineering. The main barriers were financial cost (41% of attendees), limited work experience and internships available (27%) and a need for extra support in key subject areas (26%).

AFS Global STEM Changemakers Scholarship

Janet Wei was selected to be part of the first Australia/New Zealand cohort of the AFS Global STEM Changemakers scholarship programme earlier this year. This award-winning online programme is aimed at developing innovation and entrepreneurial skills in young people in order to support them to make change in their communities. Over the course of 12 weeks, Janet completed learning modules, met in smaller groups on Zoom each week, conducted interviews, developed her understanding of global challenges like the climate emergency, and capped it all off by creating a prototype of a solution for a problem she had identified in her community. These problems included:

- food waste and lack of access to affordable food,
- lack of climate and natural disaster education and empowerment and
- lack of career planning and financial support for young people wanting to go into jobs that make a difference.

Janet earned the Advanced Certificate on Global Competence for Social Impact, from AFS and the University of Pennsylvania Center for Social Impact Strategy. Well done Janet!



Reading for pleasure during the holidays is important!

Children and teens who don't read much over the long summer holidays can lose gains they've made in their reading levels and fluency over the year. This is true for all children, but especially for children who are already struggling readers. Children who keep reading over the summer holidays can avoid the 'summer slide' and may even make reading gains for the start of the next school year.

Research on the summer slide and summer reading.

Help your child or teen read over summer

Summer reading is all about reading for pleasure. Even 10 minutes a day reading can make a big difference!

<u>Reading at home</u> — find out how you can motivate and support your child to read. Let children and teens choose their reading and keep it fun.

Summer reading is about reading for pleasure. It's important your child gets to choose what they read with the focus on relaxation and enjoyment.

- Easy reading is OK getting into the reading habit, enjoying what they're reading, and finishing more books is more important than difficulty level.
- Help children choose 'just right' books. Browse and look for interesting topics together.

Helping students choose books to read for pleasure

Engaging teens with reading

Avoid requirements for 'work' or 'study', such as writing book reviews. Instead, children and teens could keep a record of their reading through sites such as Goodreads, or taking note of the author/title/star rating. Use our summer reading log

Provide plenty of reading material

Try a variety of formats and genres such as books, ebooks, comics, magazines and audio books.

Build your own summer library of borrowed, second-hand or new material.

<u>My home library</u> — tips on developing your home library by author Anne Fine.

Visit the public library with children and ask library staff for advice about books to read. Allow your children to choose plenty of books. Most public libraries make their eBooks and eAudiobooks free to library members through apps such as Borrowbox or Libby.

Make time for reading each day

Children and teens need to read every day to maintain skills. As well as reading, it's great to just share books, look at the pictures and talk about what children or teens are reading.

- This might be a quiet time for children to read alone — it could be for 15 minutes, or just 3 bite-size sessions of 5 minutes a day.
- Read at bedtime.
- Look at reading 'on the go' with eBooks.
- Set aside some time to chat about books and reading — share things such as favourite moments, an event or character that really stood out



Navigating digital challenges

As we come to the end of our first year of "Phone Free JHC", it is timely to reflect on how it went for students and staff this year. Here are the numbers of students who had their phone confiscated at least once:

Year	# of Students	Total # of Infringements
9	78	123
10	96	165
11	100	181
12	90	162
13	58	90
Total	422	721

This was a big shift for many students and we are very proud of the way they learned the new way of being and hopefully managed to reduce some of their screen time on social media. We certainly saw a reduction of anti social behaviours online that impacted learning and needed to be addressed.

As we look to the upcoming holidays, we ask our community to reflect on the impact social media can have on young people. The term 'social media' conjures up polarising views. On one hand, students are incredibly fortunate to live in an age where a wealth of information is at their fingertips. On the other hand, the sheer volume of information they are confronted with is staggering and hard to comprehend. Our students are bombarded with so much 'stuff' that trying to make sense of it all can be overwhelming. Different trends, fashions, news, gimmicks, crises, pandemics, celebrity gossip, and conspiracy theories are thrown at them at a million miles an hour. Adding to this, there is significant evidence highlighting the negative impact that too much screen time can have on sleep, sustained concentration and self-esteem.

There is merit in social media. It's a great way to stay in touch with people, communicate snippets of information, and voice opinions and ideas on an easily accessible platform. On any given Facebook page, however, you only see what is shared through a positive lens. No one posts about their terrible day. Social media is not reality. Teenagers can struggle to understand this and can feel inadequate. It is not real and we need to keep helping young people understand this distinction.

One of the biggest issues we all face with social media is the meteoric rise of algorithms. When students hear about someone or something new and look it up, they can be exposed to ideas and theories that are false and highly damaging. Some "trending" personalities gain traction with ideas which are horrific and can be racist, homophobic or misogynistic. After clicking on a couple of these types of videos, the recommended section will become flooded with videos and content from people of the same ilk. These algorithms exploit our teenagers, who are naturally curious. Unfortunately, this can lead to people accepting only information – whether true or not – that fits their opinions, instead of basing their opinions on evidence.

Another facet of social media is the fact that many of our young people live their lives online. Everything they do, eat, or experience is posted online. Unfortunately, what they often fail to realise is that every time they post a picture or status, they are leaving a historical record. Our students need to understand that whatever they post online is there to stay and can resurface when they least expect it.

Over the holidays we encourage whānau to keep an eye on screen time and social media use. The average 15 year old in New Zealand spends more than 3 hours a day using screens. Almost one-quarter spend over 6 hours a day on the internet outside of school. Checking the screen time and what apps have been used most frequently is a simple step we encourage all caregivers to take regularly. This opens the dialogue and helps students navigate these difficult territories.

What JHC can and does do:

- Teach cyber-safety skills that highlight the challenges of social media
- Teach our students the importance of critical thinking, including understanding the origin of sources, bias, and how to critically assess the limitations of evidence
- Incorporate social media units into our programmes
- Ban the use of mobile phones throughout College, and confiscate immediately when the rules are broken.
- Deal firmly and effectively with any online bullying.

What parents can do:

- Educate themselves about the impact of social media
- Discuss their child's social media use
- Regulate the use of mobile phones and social media at home.

What our students can do:

- Regulate their own social media use
- Delete, rather than share, harmful content via social media
- Not be passive when they see others using social media inappropriately.

Confidence and Motivation



Brigadier James Hargest, we remember him

Brigadier James Hargest 1891 - 1944, CBE, DSO & TWO BARS, MC, VD, MP was a statesman, a farmer and a decorated war hero. Our school is proud to bear his name. His life story has inspired generations of our students, past and present, and will continue to do so long in the future. His achievements and characteristics are celebrated in our school values, our school crest and in our school's motto, Keep Faith.

These Pou, carved by sculptor John Wishart, have been created in consultation with Waihōpai Rūnaka and are an ancestral acknowledgement of our place, our whenua and our whakapapa. They honour the spirit of Brigadier James Hargest and his enduring importance to our kura. The first Pou appropriately started life as a tōtara farm strainer post. Strainer posts are considered the most important posts in the fence line. They carry the strain of the fence and support the gates. The



totara strainer posts from which the Pou began represent the strength of character and unwavering cornerstone of support that the Brigadier was to the men who served under him in WW2. The "pintle" or gate hinge is both a literal nod to the Rakauhauka farming background of the Brigadier, and also a metaphorical symbol of the opportunity within all of our rangatahi to determine their own path. A pintle hinge has all the benefits of a higher safety profile, demonstrating the secure base of manaakitanga and whanaungatanga we provide for all ākonga as well as the greater range of movement which represents the multitude of opportunities within and beyond our school gates. The rifle embedded in the sculpture is an Enfield 303, standard issue to troops under his command. It references his military contribution in both World Wars and the leadership, mana and tenacity he demonstrated in every circumstance. The second Pou was carved from one piece of 100 year old wood. It stands as a metaphorical nod to the Brigadier as a warrior with the Tewhatewha standing proudly. The Tewhatewha is carved with representations of a hammerhead shark. In te ao Māori, the hammerhead shark is one of the main kaitiaki or guardians in the ocean. The innate characteristics represented by the hammerhead of strength, determination, strong will and fighting spirit are all epitomised by Brigadier James Hargest and are attributes we want to encourage in our students. The Pou is also carved with whatero (a poking out of the tongue). The whatero is a symbol of fearlessness and strength that's become an iconic part of New Zealand's heritage. It is used as an act of defiance and a warning to enemies. The Pou symbolises the importance of recognising our role of guardianship for our rangatahi, both as protectors and as caretakers.

In 1958 James Hargest Memorial High School was opened as a living tribute to the exceptional Southlander Brigadier James Hargest. These Pou will guide our kura as we seek everyday to fulfil our Mission "to equip all our students to create the best possible future for themselves and their world." We are grateful for the lessons and the guiding force our namesake has gifted us. His name, tenacious resilience and responsibility are a taonga we value highly.

A successful first day saw JHC top their pool with wins over Riccarton High School Yr 9 A, Rolleston College A, and Rangiora High School. The team set themselves a high bar with contributions from everyone towards their consistent serving, amazing passing, and scrambly defence.

The second day started off much the same with a victory over local competitors, Central Southland College B, setting up a topof-the-table clash with St Margaret's College B. Unfortunately, the team struggled with consistency in the match, eventually falling 2 sets to 1.

Finishing second in their pool meant a match-up with Division 3 tournament favourite, Hillview Christian School, in the semifinals. The girls knew it was going to be a tough match as Hillview were undefeated thus far and hadn't even dropped one set. Playing some of their best volleyball of the season, the team went toe-to-toe with the eventual Division 3 champions, losing 2 sets to 1. While it was disappointing not to make the gold medal match, the team took solace in knowing they were the only team that took a set off the champions the entire tournament.

In the bronze medal match, JHC faced off with another familiar foe, Wakatipu High School B. The match was a back-and-forth affair with each team struggling to get the upper hand. In the end, Wakatipu pipped JHC in the final set and came away with a 2 sets to 1 win. As a coach, it was exciting to see the whole team support one another throughout the match and come together to celebrate our 4th place finish.

For a team comprised of many athletes playing competitive volleyball for the first time, the results the team achieved on and off the court were fantastic. Opposition coaches and athletes raved throughout the tournament about the tenacity, skills, and maturity of the JHC athletes, as well as the sportsmanship displayed. It was easy to see why so many other teams and coaches were rooting for JHC during their playoff matches.

While it was disappointing not to finish off the long season with a win, the athletes had done the region and their school proud with their skill development, dedication and sportsmanship they displayed throughout. It was amazing to see how much each player developed and progressed throughout the season and tournament. Hopefully we'll see our players all again next year!


