This Diploma provides the framework against which students are now assessed in Year 11. It maintains and protects academic rigour, while incorporating wider holistic educational goals. Year 11 is an important year where students are gaining the skills and knowledge to achieve to the best of their ability in NCEA Level Two the following year.

Course of Study


Students will undertake three compulsory courses in English, Maths and Science. Students also select three additional specialist subjects from our wide range of options.


Diploma Structure

Each Subject counts towards the total academic score. The total maximum score per course is 100. The six scores are added to create a score out of 600. They are converted to a Diploma Level. The Diploma may also be endorsed with important aspects such as Sports, Cultural or Āwhina contribution.

Assessment towards the Diploma:

This can consist of projects, presentations, tests, homework, examinations, checkpoints and planning materials. These will be dependent on the course. Assessments contribute to a total score for the course. Attendance and Hargest Way grades also form part of the data used to determine which level of the Diploma has been attained.

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Every Day Matters

In New Zealand there is a very clear relationship between attendance at school and achievement in NCEA. Simply put, students who regularly attend school are much more likely to achieve NCEA qualifications than students who do not attend as regularly.

Students who attend school 100% of the time achieve, on average, 13 to 15 more credits in NCEA than do students who attend 90% of the time. In 2019, the then Associate Minister of Education Tracey Martin, identified that "students attending 95 percent of days in Year 10 later get an average of 75 credits at Level 3", easily enough to gain the qualification. Conversely, "Year 10s who attend 85 percent of the time, only about half go on to achieve NCEA Level 3."

While the attendance data we are provided with by the Ministry of Education shows that our rangatahi attend school more regularly than all of the comparison groups, the percentage of students who regularly attend has declined over recent years.

Beginning in Week Four of this term you will receive attendance reports three times a term to help keep

you informed about your child's level of attendance. Where there are concerns we will be in contact with you to offer our support so that we can help all students to attend regularly and consequently give themselves the best chance of achieving their potential.

Our aim is to have all ākonga attending school 90% of the time as a minimum. While 90% sounds like a high number, this equates to missing one day of school each fortnight, which translates to nearly a month of school lost over the course of the year.

Our school Guidance Counsellors, Homeroom Teachers, Deans and Form Teachers are available to support you in removing barriers to support attendance and achievement. If you are concerned about your child we encourage you to make contact with us sooner rather than later so that we can work with you and support can be put in place before any attendance issues, or other problems, become ingrained habits that are more difficult to change.

Thank you for your support of this important mahi. Lifting attendance rates benefits all students and is an essential step on the pathway to success.

Guide to reporting 2025

Senior Campus

Our reporting is continually developing in response to best practice in both assessment and feedback based on educational research. As you continue your journey as a parent at James Hargest College, we trust that our reporting provides you with great starting points for meaningful learning discussions with your rangatahi.

We have three key report types at James Hargest College in 2025. These are all distributed via the Kamar Portal

1. Reporting on the Haraest Wav

Hargest Way reports are released three times per term. These are designed to give whānau, students, and the pastoral team an indication of how a student is tracking across their subjects by looking at the trends in the report. They are useful in highlighting any changes in work patterns as a prompt for further discussions. They should not be treated as a definitive comment on a student's success, but rather an indicator as to whether a student is on track or not. There are two categories in the report: Effort and Respect.

2: Live Reports

Comments on your child's work and achievement is provided 'in real time' through the Kamar Portal. Live Reports are linked to either progression checkpoints or significant pieces of work. They may or may not have a grade published, depending on the context of the teacher's comment. Teachers are asked to write a brief comment that provides feedback to the students and advice on next steps. You, as the parent, are 'looking in' on

3: Achievement Reporting - end of Term Two and **Four**

Twice yearly you will receive an achievement report which shows grades earned in all subjects as well as attendance data. These reports will include a student reflection and goal setting comment. Students will be asked to look at what they have achieved over the previous two terms and look forward to what they want to focus on next. These are designed to give you an achievement summary and another opportunity for a learning discussion with your young person. There will also be a comment from your child's Homeroom or Form Teacher about their progress to date.



Cambridge Class





Our inaugural Cambridge classes are off to a cracking start! On Friday 31 January 2025 they headed into school a few days earlier than their peers to engage in an initial session with all four teachers of the Cambridge Courses. This session focussed on team work, building a sense of community, setting expectations alongside some creativity and fun. Students spent time talking with one another, getting to know those who weren't well known to them yet. They had to try and solve the Zin Obelisk, create the tallest spaghetti tower to hold a marshmallow, and then created their shared expectations for Effort and Respect. It was a lovely way to break the ice for the two years ahead.

Subject classes are underway now too, of course!

In English students have been delving into the poem 'Begin with a Mountain' by Nina Mingya Powles, which will be used as a model for creating our own identity poems.

In Global Perspectives students have been discovering and exploring significant issues from a variety of perspectives in a range






of contexts, from the global to the local.

Rongohia te Hau Action Plan 2025

Thank you very much to all whānau who took the time to give us feedback about James Haregst College in these surveys. Your feedback genuinely makes a difference and we consider it very carefully when we plan our next steps. From Rongohia te Hau, the feedback was definitely around key themes, How can we hear our students and whānau? In our classrooms are we having courageous conversations? Are we all open to learning? There was a clear difference in our survey data in regards to how effectively we think we are applying the principles of ako (The concept of ako describes a teaching and learning relationship, where the educator is also learning from the student and where educators' practices are informed by the latest research and are both deliberate and reflective. Ako is grounded in the principle of reciprocity and also recognises that the learner and whānau cannot be

separated.) and how students and whanau The second key aspect we have perceive this in our classrooms. We have created an Action Plan for 2025 with key aspects to try to address this disparity.

The key aspects of our Action Plan this year include: Early and regular open invitation whānau hui. The key pātai we would love your help with are: What information do whānau want to hear discussion with others about what they from us?

How would they like to receive this information?

What are your aspirations for the education of your tamariki? How can we work with you to help them achieve their dreams?

Duke of EdinburghSilver and Gold Adventurous Journey

On 9 December, 16 adventurous Duke of Edinburgh students flew into Mason's Bay, Stewart Island where they landed on the beach. The purpose: to put into practice the skills we have learned over the years.

We met up at the airport, only to find that our flights were slightly delayed due the Southland weather. The ride in the small 8-seater was a little bumpy, but the views were exquisite. We trekked 8 kms down the beach before heading off track to Mason Bay Hut. That evening, we hunted for kiwi, played highly competitive card games and befriended a probably rather overwhelmed fellow tramper.

Masons Bay was the site of a farm from 1874-1985. Nowadays, some of the buildings are still standing, including the homestead, which is used to accommodate DOC workers. We walked past these buildings on the second day as we tramped to Freshwater Hut. The track was created in the 1930s for access to Freshwater Landing, and is approximately 16km long. It was an enjoyable day filled with camaraderie and beautiful sights. Mason's Bay is home to an impressive and extensive patch of sand dunes, which played host to much fun that day. We were also pleasantly surprised to stumble upon a juvenile spotted kiwi, whom we watched with interest and dubbed 'Philip'. All in all, we were glad to remove our waterlogged boots at Freshwater Hut. This was a picturesque hut that overlooked a river. Here, we met a DOC ranger who devotes his time to protecting the endangered Southern New Zealand dotterel/pukunui, with only 101 remaining. It was fascinating to learn about the dotterel and its predators.

The following day, we water taxied out to Golden Bay and continued with our tramping by completing local walks. We spent that night in Oban at the backpackers. We were all thrilled to have a shower, especially some of us who had to be pulled out of the waistdeep mud. The next day was spent doing another walk before catching the ferry home. We were super thankful to the adults - Mr Kleinhans, Mr Graham, Miss Thomas and Ms Smith, who supervised our adventures. We had some great weather for tramping and it was fabulous to explore less well-known spots on Stewart Island. By Natalie Snoek

Throughout the event, I engaged in interactive workshops and heard from inspiring speakers. A highlight for me was learning how to bring together a team in any circumstance, a skill that


will be key to my leadership journey.

Phone Free JHC

The use of mobile devices (including smart watches and ear pods) during school hours is not permitted at JHC. This includes between classes, intervals and lunchtime. At the Junior Campus, devices must be switched off and handed to your classroom teacher. At the Senior Campus phones (and/or smart watches) must be left at home or switched off and in the student's bag. Head phones may be required for teaching and learning, in the classroom, connected to a computer. They may not be connected to a phone or used at break times. Mobile devices must not be visible, in pockets or on their person and cannot be used.

If students are found to be using their phone during school hours, the phone will be confiscated by staff for the remainder of the day. It will need to be collected from the Main Office (Junior Campus) or Student Administration (Senior Campus).

Defiance or repeated offences will result in additional consequences in line with our JHC pastoral process. Whānau will be contacted and asked to come in to help to resolve any ongoing issues.

Some FAQ's

What if my child needs their phone for medical reasons?

Exemptions for medical reasons involving tracking

with mobile phones can be applied for to the Associate Principal of either Campus. Where a student has been granted an exemption, they must use their mobile phone for the purpose for which the exemption was granted and in a safe, ethical and responsible manner.

How will students access their timetables?

Students will be given a hard copy of their timetable. They will be encouraged to look after it and glue it into a book that stays in their bag.

How will students tell the time?

All classrooms will have a clock. It would be great if whānau could teach those who have not yet learnt to read a clock.

Will students be allowed to use Apple Pay at the canteen?

Students will need to bring their eftpos card or cash to use the canteen. They will not be able to use Apple Pay.

What if parents want to contact their child?

If parents need to contact their child during the school day, they can contact the main office to have a message delivered to the student in class. Alternatively, whānau can send an email which can be accessed on a student's laptop. For students who need to contact their whānau during the day, they can use the phone at the front office.

What if teachers need to use phones for a task in class?

In specific situations, staff may permit the use of mobile phones. Examples may include: Specific learning activities in the classroom, some excursions and camps.

In all of these exceptions, the exception must be approved by SLT and whānau will be informed of the class, task and time period where phones will be required.
