We are so excited about the year ahead and the requests that will be presented to us.



Social Media & Comparison Culture

A School I V topic supporting modern-day parenting

WHĀNAU KŌRERO

Young people today are growing up in a world where exposure to other people's lives is constant. Through social media and other platforms, they are regularly presented with curated highlights - from flawless holiday photos and academic milestones to the latest fashion trends and fitness achievements. This continuous stream of idealised content fuels what is known as comparison culture, where self-worth is often measured by how someone stacks up against others.

For children and adolescents, who are still figuring out who they are, this culture can be particularly damaging. Constantly comparing their appearance, achievements, or social standing to friends, influencers, and even strangers can lead to unrealistic

expectations and a skewed sense of self-worth. This relentless need to measure up can contribute to feelings of inadequacy, self-doubt, and anxiety - undermining both confidence and emotional wellbeing.

It's vital that parents and caregivers understand how deeply comparison culture can influence a child's self-perception and sense of value. Left unchecked, it can foster perfectionism and a dependence on external validation, where a 'like' or comment becomes the measure of their worth.

The good news is, families have a powerful role to play in helping young people navigate these challenges. This Special Report will help you empower your child to build the resilience and confidence needed to navigate today's comparison-driven world and embrace their own unique path.


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Many families find it easier to make regular payments of \$20 per fortnight or \$10 per week for each child.

Attendance

One of the things we are continuing to focus on in 2025 is student attendance. You will hear us talking about this with you, with our students and it remains a strong subject of conversation in the staff room.

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss more than a whole year of school by 16 years of age. As a parent or caregiver, you, alongside our school, play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance.

All students are legally required to attend school every day and it is a shared responsibility to make sure students attend and engage in learning from when they first start school.

You must let the school know if your child is going to be absent or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure. Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent.

If you are finding it hard to get your child to school, please talk with us so we can work together. Our school is committed to supporting your child to attend school.

Our school continues to build a culture that fosters attendance every day by having:

- School staff who have strong relationships with students and family.
- A school culture that recognises your child and your family for who you are, where you come from and what you value.
- A school whānau that takes all practical steps to make sure your child is at school and progressing in their learning.
- A school that is safe and welcoming for everyone in our school community.





Your Online Access to Teaching Staff at Hargest

The age of e-mail contact has had the effect of making teacher/parent and teacher/ student communication much easier, and, as a result, much more frequent! Generally this has been very positive for all of us.

Whilst staff accessibility is encouraged, we have recognised the need for some guidelines in order to allow staff to "switch off" after normal work hours. (Part of being a "Good Employer").

Guidelines/Expectations

- We recognise that parents often send e-mails in evenings or weekends. (When they have time to attend to parenting issues!) However, staff are not expected to read or reply to e-mails after hours (ie during evenings, weekends or holidays).
- Staff response time will be variable according to their workload and teaching pressures. They are expected to acknowledge your email the next working day, and, where required, follow up with a more detailed response as soon as practicable (generally within two more days).
- Online accessibility of teachers by students follows the same guidelines, ie:
 - queries and questions may not be read or answered "after hours"
 - response times will vary
 - responses will be made as soon as practicable








BRIGADIER JAMES HARGEST,

WE REMEMBER HIM

BRIGADIER JAMES HARGEST 1891 - 1944, CBE, DSO & TWO BARS, MC, VD, MP WAS A STATESMAN, A FARMER AND A DECORATED WAR HERO, OUR SCHOOL IS PROUD TO BEAR HIS NAME. HIS LIFE STORY HAS INSPIRED **GENERATIONS OF OUR** STUDENTS, PAST AND PRESENT, AND WILL CONTINUE TO DO SO LONG IN THE FUTURE. HIS **ACHIEVEMENTS AND** CHARACTERISTICS ARE **CELEBRATED IN OUR SCHOOL VALUES, OUR SCHOOL CREST** AND IN OUR SCHOOL'S MOTTO, KEEP FAITH.

These Pou, carved by sculptor John Wishart, have been created in consultation with Waihōpai Rūnaka and are an ancestral acknowledgement of our place, our whenua and our whakapapa. They honour the spirit of Brigadier James Hargest and his enduring importance to our kura.



The first Pou appropriately started life as a totara farm strainer post. Strainer posts are considered the most important posts in the fence line. They carry the strain of the fence and support the gates. The tōtara strainer posts from which the Pou began represent the strength of character and unwavering cornerstone of support that the Brigadier was to the men who served under him in WW2. The "pintle" or gate hinge is both a literal nod to the Rakauhauka farming background of the Brigadier, and also a metaphorical symbol of the opportunity within all of our rangatahi to determine their own path. A pintle hinge has all the benefits of a higher safety profile, demonstrating the secure base of manaakitanga and whanaungatanga we provide for all ākonga as well as the greater range of movement which represents the multitude of opportunities within and beyond our school gates. The rifle embedded in the sculpture is an Enfield 303, standard issue to troops under his command. It references his military contribution in both World Wars and the leadership, mana and tenacity he demonstrated in every circumstance. The second Pou was carved from one piece of 100 year old wood. It stands as a metaphorical nod to the Brigadier as a warrior with the Tewhatewha standing



The Tewhatewha is carved with representations of a hammerhead shark. In te ao Māori, the hammerhead shark is one of the main kaitiaki or guardians in the ocean. The innate characteristics represented by the hammerhead of strength, determination, strong will and fighting spirit are all epitomised by Brigadier James Hargest and are attributes we want to encourage in our students. The Pou is also carved with whatero (a poking out of the tongue). The whatero is a symbol of fearlessness and strength that's become an iconic part of New Zealand's heritage. It is used as an act of defiance and a warning to enemies. The Pou symbolises the importance of recognising our role of guardianship for our rangatahi, both as protectors and as caretakers.

In 1958 James Hargest Memorial High School was opened as a living tribute to the exceptional Southlander Brigadier James Hargest. These Pou will guide our kura as we seek everyday to fulfil our Mission "to equip all our students to create the best possible future for themselves and their world." We are grateful for the lessons and the guiding force our namesake has gifted us. His name, tenacious resilience and responsibility are a taonga we value highly.






Volley South Board Member
